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Design Citations for Canadian Publications of 1997

For this, the Society's sixteenth annual presentation of design awards, the undersigned panel of three judges spent April 25, 1998 examining a record 347 books published in Canada during 1997, each entered into competition by its Canadian publisher or designer. Producers (platemakers, printers, binders, etc.) are not necessarily Canadian: economic, and formerly also technical, reasons have always taken some production elsewhere. Not every eligible organization submits work to this competition, although each January, the Society makes every effort to locate and notify every Canadian publisher and graphic arts firm known to take book work. Still, those submitted are representative of the quality now expected in the Canadian book industries.

Design Citations for Canadian Publications of 1997

In judging the merits of a group of well-designed books it is very difficult not to start reading them, because the point in designing books, after all, is first, to make them attractive and then to make them eminently readable. This year's collection of entries was no exception, but the judges managed, with great discipline, to get through the task in the allotted time.

The 1997 submissions fell into the following categories:



The Award Winners

Prose Fiction

Fiction is easier to judge because most books follow the same format. This year, however, there were few real award winners because to the judge's eyes the entries were so undistinguished. Primarily one looks at the title page, chapter openings, running heads, text face, margins and paper stock. The few that satisfied basic requirements received a third and honourable mentions, but none stood out. One problem that causes such a lack of distinction is that publishers lavish great effort on striking bookjackets that will look good in the bookstore. And who can blame them, but oftentimes the jackets aren't even designed by the book designer. Title page design was virtually non-existent, except in the third place winner and in the honourable mentions.

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Poetry

There were three poetry books that stood out from the rest quite strikingly, and the judge's comments on each one give an idea why. The rest deserve comment, however, because of the unimaginative treatment they received. Surely different poets and even different poems do not fit the same dull, endlessly repeated mould that was generally followed. It makes one long for the halcyon days of the 1950s and 1960s, when the trade publishers were selling poetry books like crazy, all designed by Canada's great crop of book designers-Paul Arthur, Frank Newfeld, Bill Toye, Sam Smart, Tak Tanabe, and others. One Canadian book even made it to the Fifty Books-of-the-Year in New York.











An interesting lot of books because they cover such a wide range of subjects and book design problems. Text books alone range from grade one primers to complex college texts of the kind that won an award this year. The range of reference books is also vast, and the judges had this year a representative sampling of this great variety, from a guide to the universe down to a typographical gem on the subject of vultures. One of the most stunning award-winners appeared in this category-an atlas on railways and waterways in Canada.

Concluding Comments

The Society's requests for submissions to this competition go to every known Canadian publisher and as many designers and design companies as are known to its Awards Committee to work on books. In January 1998, the Committee sent out approximately 450 notices of this competition. We were delighted to receive some 347 submissions, a substantial increase from the 250 submissions in 1997. The judges would always like to see more submissions; some fine Canadian design is surely being missed in these awards.

Judging any artistic endeavour involves the discussion of objective evidences as seen by each judge from a

subjective point of view. Instant unanimity that a particular prize should be awarded to a particular book does occur, but it is not typical of the day's discussions. No single judge among us would, independently, have arrived at all and only the above list of awards. This list is the result of compromises of initial reactions with reflective assessment of those reactions during discussion. Robert Reid trusts that in this report, his compilation of hours of the comments of his fellow judges, constitutes a balanced summary of their views as well as his own.

The Alcuin Society

The Alcuin Society was founded in 1965 by G.A. Spencer for booklovers world-wide to promote a wider appreciation of what goes into finely-wrought books. The name "Alcuin" was chosen to honour the memory of Alcuin of York (735 to 804 AD). Alcuin was a man who cared not only about books but handwriting too, which he rescued from the proliferation of bastard styles of the period. As, in effect, Charlemagne's "Minister of Culture", Alcuin selected the most pleasing and certainly the most legible script of his day, and gave it official blessing. Known as the "Caroline Minuscule", it ultimately led to our modern lower-case alphabet.

To further its aims, The Alcuin Society engages in a wide range of activities, many in collaboration with the Canadian Centre for Studies in Publishing at Simon Fraser University: lectures, workshops, exhibitions, and competitions. Annual design awards are made by a panel ofjudges for the best in Canadian book design. *Amphora*, the Society's quarterly journal, covers a wide range of topics related to the book arts: collecting, typography, type design, type-setting, calligraphy, paper-making, ornamentation, illustration, printing and binding.
